Case 1

Age, gender, profession

Prescription

- Failed multiple topical corticosteroid treatments
- Recently tried triamcinolone 0.1%, which did not work
- Intolerant to multiple non-steroidal topicals

History of current illness

- Low BSA
- · Severe itch impacting his day-to-day life

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Case 2

Age, gender, profession 33 years old, female,

scientific writer

Lifestyle habits

Enjoys craftmanship

Prescription

Clobetasol 0.05% cream hands BID prn

History of current illness

- Hands (<10% BSA)
- Has adapted her life to her condition (limited social activities, tries to work remotely when possible)
